## THE NEIGHBOURHOOD

AUL

Doint St. Charles is an old working-class neighbourhood situated in the South-West of Montreal. Although the population was as high as 35 000 during the industrial boom, the population has stabilised over the last 15 years to approximately 13 500. The revenue of close to 50% of households barely covers basic needs. In 1995, 46% of the population lived on social security, while today the percentage hovers around 42%. French is the mother tongue of 58% of residents, English that of 28%, while other languages are used by more or less 14% of neighbourhood folks. Out of Point St. Charles' 5800 units, 2500 are social housing (non profit, cooperative and low-income housing). This is the highest concentration of social housing in a similar neighbourhood in all of Canada. A remarkable phenomenon due without a doubt to years of active struggle.
